Because of the money we spent purchasing the land we now have to change the way that we do business. We are going to have to look at every dollar that we spend and cut back on expenditures wherever possible. If we all work together everything will work out just fine. We are presently carrying no debt and the goal of your executive is to keep it that way.

Many of you were not members of our organization when we first started fundraising efforts for this project. At that time, many club members dug deep into their pockets and donated generously to the project. ## Hallelujah! The Club's Future is Secure.

While 2005 will always be remembered as the year the Club celebrated its 100 years of service to the community, 2010 will be remembered as the year the Club took a huge step forward by extending its land base to over 100 acres. Now that the Club has title to the land base needed to operate its ranges and trails, there remain only two final tasks for the Land Purchase Committee before its work is completed: the preparation and mailing of letters of thanks to donors, and the creation and placement of a permanent plaque recording their names on the wall of the Clubhouse.

While these administrative items are being attended to, we must prepare for a period of upheaval. Shortly Island Timberlands (IT) will be moving in to begin the process of road building followed by logging and finally replanting. These operations will take place on a section of the Club's original 20 acres and on the land recently obtained. Under the terms of the purchase agreement, IT has three years to complete its work.

We expect that the road, which will be located essentially around the perimeter of our property, will be constructed this fall/early winter. IT will then likely begin logging almost immediately and proceed throughout the winter months. The exact timing will be determined later in discussions with the Club. While IT is on our property there will be regular meetings between us to ensure that any impact on the operation of the ranges, especially when being used by enforcement agencies and other fee paying clients, will be kept to a minimum. The liaison function between IT and the Club will be carried out by a new Land Management Committee (LMC) – likely composed of the members of the current Land Purchase Committee with the addition of other directors as needed. The first task for the new LMC will be to ensure that the boundaries of our property are marked and posted as required under the Firearms Act for the operation of our ranges. This will also meet one of our new commitments as the owner of private managed forest land, namely the “marking of external property boundaries”. The second task of the LMC will be the establishment of a land use plan in consultation with the discipline chairs and others as deemed appropriate, to provide guidance with respect to the replanting program. This process will identify different areas of proposed use and thereby dictate the variety of trees to be planted and preferred densities. Once this has been completed and approved, it will be the blueprint to be followed by IT in its replanting operation. The membership will be kept informed as the plan takes shape and be given an opportunity to comment on the plan before it is finalized.

### Certificate of Insurance Now Required by Law Enforcement



BCWF's Insurance provider, HUB International, has informed BCWF that Police and Conservation Officers now require BCWF members using their ATVs while actively hunting and fishing to carry both their BCWF membership card and a certificate of insurance. Direct BCWF members may download a copy of the insurance certificate from the BCWF website (<http://www.bcdf.bc.ca/committees/insurance>). If you are a club member of BCWF, you must obtain a copy of the club's certificate from your club. Each club has its own insurance policy with Hub.

## THE INDICATOR STRIKES BACK!!



Ever get that feeling that something is taking your presentation...but you don't set, in fear of ruining a perfect drift? More often than not your instincts are right. For those of us who are not willing to gamble or those just learning, a strike indicator can confirm what your gut is already telling you. FISH ON!!

As water temperatures get colder and as fall turns to winter, hits get a lot less obvious. So again a strike indicator is paramount in being successful in identifying a willing participant. So using a weighted fly and indicator (or split shot where permitted) is an exciting way to angle. It gets you down in the zone where the trout are, while allowing you to easily detect strikes. It's quite a feeling watching your indicator get devoured by the river...or when it stops mid drift then proceeds to move up stream.

There are a few different types of strike indicators that can be used. From foam, to balsa wood or just using bright coloured wool. You can also use a steelhead corkie, pinning the desired depth with a toothpick. Wool has its advantages over heavier or bulkier indicators when fishing low clear water, where fish can be startled easier. When fishing faster deeper water more weight and a more buoyant indicator are required. So remember getting the fly into the strike zone is crucial and knowing when the fish is striking is an integral part of being successful. Try using an indicator and I promise you'll catch more fish...Enjoy the fall and don't forget to do your part in conservation and keeping our rivers and lakes clean.

### Private Member's Bill to get rid of long gun registry defeated.

The vote is now in and the motion put forward by Liberal MP Mark Holland to kill Bill C-391 passed by 2 votes, 153 to 151. The Liberal Party was assisted in this affront to democracy by a number of rural NDP and Liberal MPs who, this time around, ignored their constituents wishes and voted on party lines, succumbing to considerable pressure from their leaders. MP Candice Hoepfner's private members bill to get rid of the long gun registry is now dead and **will not** proceed to 3<sup>rd</sup> reading.

## A Calamity Waiting to Happen

Having disposed of the threat to the Club's future from outside – the land purchase – it is now time to handle the threat from within – the lack of range officers. These volunteers are needed to enable the Club to operate its ranges legally and safely.

While the Caretaker functions as a range officer while on duty, he cannot spend all of his time supervising shooting activities when there are buildings and grounds to be cared for. In addition he has days off, statutory holidays and vacations when there must be volunteer range officers on the premises to fulfill our legal responsibilities regarding the operation of the ranges. Qualified members must step forward now to help handle these situations or there will be days when the ranges will have to be closed.

In the past the Club managed to obtain the necessary volunteers and set up a range officer schedule to ensure full coverage. Recently, however, the system seems to have broken down and the Caretaker cannot cope. Hopefully a new schedule will be set up in the near future if sufficient volunteers can be found. If not, it will surely be only a matter of time before something serious happens and our permit to operate is put in jeopardy.

There have been incidents where range rules have been casually applied or knowingly ignored. Fortunately no serious accidents have occurred as yet, but our luck may run out at any time. We cannot afford to lose the ranges given their importance to the membership and their significant contribution to the income to the Club.

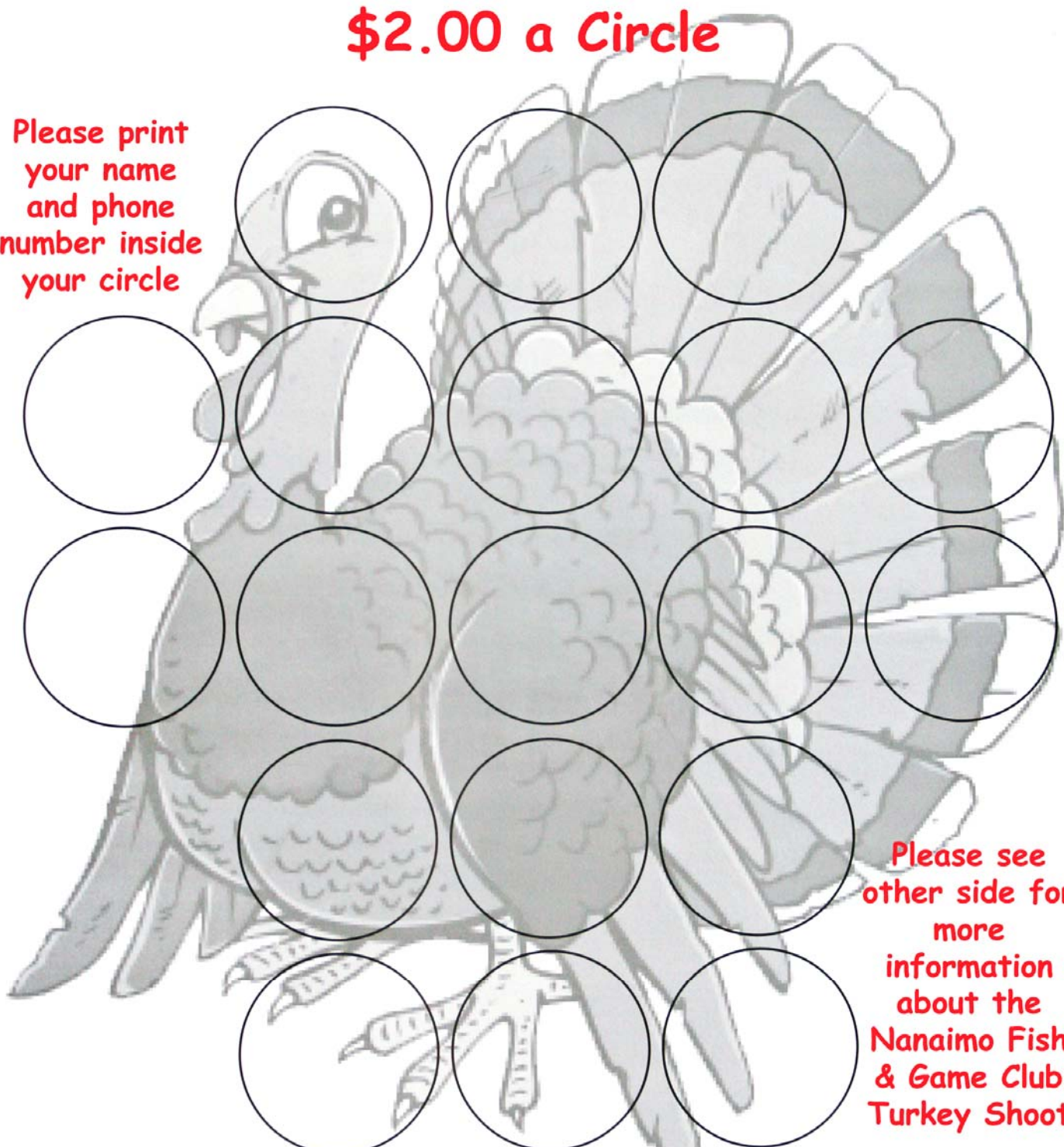

## Attention Discipline Chairpersons

### 2011 Event Dates

On Wednesday November 3, 2010 at 7:30 PM the Discipline Chairpersons will meet in the trap building to set the dates for their events to be held in 2011.

Each Chairperson, or his official designate, **must attend** to set his dates for the upcoming year. These dates are set by consensus and once set they are confirmed and cannot be changed without the agreement of the chairperson who holds the date. If you fail to attend and set your date you will only be left with those dates not already spoken for, and will have no say in setting the schedule.

When setting your dates plan well in advance what you are looking for. Include not only the dates for your actual event but any dates around it that you want to have for a set up or clean up date, or to hold a practice event beforehand. Also make sure you let everyone know which ranges you want closed in addition to the one the event is being held on.

In some cases a discipline must set their dates with a national governing body prior to the date of our meeting. In those cases the discipline chair must notify the caretaker in writing and those dates will be set on a first come first served basis.
